Based on the work by Dr. Dewey Cornell and the Virginia Youth Violence Project

This training is highly relevant to the school systems because of the Act 18 of 2019. Act 18 of 2019 amended the Public School Code of 1949 by adding Article XIII-E, Threat Assessment, which requires each school entity in Pennsylvania to establish a threat assessment team. Threat assessment training allows for school teams to have a global understanding of threats and how to address student needs.

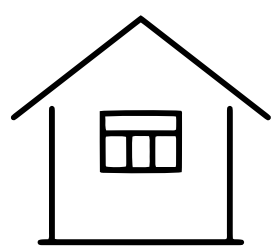

ABOUT CSTAG

Research through the CSTAG training model found: “Our published studies found that schools using this model were able to resolve threats safely and effectively, allowing almost all students to return to school. Fewer than 1% of threats resulted in a physical act of violence (all fights with no serious injuries). Studies also found that schools had lower suspension rates and fewer alternative school transfers, with no racial/ethnic disparities for Black and Hispanic students. Students in special education programs received similar outcomes to other students. On school climate surveys, students and teachers reported less bullying and more positive perceptions of school climate than students and teachers in the control group schools.”
